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Starting School at Pegasus Bay

....a guide for parents of New Entrants



Starting school is a HUGE milestone in your child's development. We've created this booklet to help you and your child prepare for school.

When does my child need to start school?

We have adopted a "cohort entry" process for new entrant students. This means that new entrants will join the school at the next cohort entry date after they turn 5. There will be two cohort entry points per school term in week 1 and week 6. Check the school calendar on our phone app or <u>Term Dates</u> page on our school website for these dates.

Background Information on cohort entry (shared as part of our consultation)

Traditionally, children in Aotearoa (New Zealand) start school on their fifth birthday or any day after that. Recent changes to the Education Act mean schools can adopt cohort entry: enrolling children in groups on specific days across the year.

Schools are choosing cohort entry to support positive transitions, well-being, and learning.

From 1 January 2020, changes made to the Act (through the Education Amendment Act 2019) took effect so that:

- children will be able start school in cohorts but only after they have turned five;
- there will be two entry points per term, one on the first day of term, and one at a mid-point during a term.

The benefits of Cohort Entry

- Cohort entry helps tamariki to settle easier and have a successful transition to school.
- Starting school alongside other children helps them build relationships benefiting their social and emotional well-being.
- Student learning benefits as teachers can plan for uninterrupted periods of time.
- There is less disruption and stress for new entrant teachers who can prepare for groups of children arriving on a specific date rather than on an individual and ad hoc basis through the year.
- Schools can better anticipate student numbers allowing Principals to strategically plan for transitions and welcoming events.
- It supports whanau to connect with the school and enable teachers to address parents in a group about important points around schooling and school entry.
- Cohort entry can enable new parents to meet each other and make connections.

New entrant or year 1?

Children who join us in the first three cohort entry dates of the year, are classified as year 1, children who join from mid-term 2 onwards, begin as year 0, and will be year 1 the following year. We are open to a discussion regarding children who join at the mid term 2 entry point - based on the child's holistic development, and in collaboration with you, they may move to year 1 or 2 the following year.

My child has turned 4, what should I do?

What is the enrolment process?

First you need to complete our online enrolment form. Then get in touch with the office to make a time to come in to complete the enrolment process (usually each Friday). You will meet with either Jared Kelly, our Principal, or Di Murphy / Rachel Robinson our Deputy Principals. They will talk you through how our school operates and will answer any questions you may have.

They will also get relevant information about your child and your family from you. This includes health information, what your child is interested in/good at, any anxieties your child or you might have about starting school, your child's preschool experience, and any family information that is helpful for us to know.

We encourage you to bring your child along to this meeting, so they are fully involved in the whole process from the start and can see what it's all about.

They will show you around the new entrant space, and answer any questions you may have about our school.

You will need to provide proof of address, birth certificate (and passport if your child is not born in New Zealand) as well as immunisation information prior to the enrolment being confirmed.

The Nest:

We pride ourselves on providing a transition that is focused on cultivating a sense of belonging and ensuring tamariki (children) experience consistency and trust. The Nest has been developed with the intention to provide a transition to school space to equip the tamariki with the skills and learning attitudes to have success in their learning here at school. Tamariki start in the Nest from their start date with a kaiako (teacher) who specialises in school transition. Tamariki can stay in the Nest up to 10 weeks before moving out into the main space in Pekapeka where they will be with a dedicated homeroom and kaiako for the rest of the year.

What about transition visits?

During the last week of each term, we run a transition to school visit for tamariki who are starting in the following term in the next two cohorts. This morning is a chance to meet the Nest teacher, become familiar with the Nest learning space and the other Tamariki that they will be starting with.

The transition morning is invite-only and for tamariki who are starting school within the next two cohort entries. We also facilitate a parent information session during the transition morning in our library with one of our deputy principals. It is strongly encouraged that all tamariki attend this transition morning. It runs from 9am-10.30am and you will be formally invited via email by Sally Patterson (our new entrant lead teacher) once you have completed the enrolment process.

With cohort entry and the Nest, there is an expectation that tamariki will start on their cohort entry day. Tamariki can ease into school with shorter days during that first week, on an individual needs basis. This will be organised with the tamaiti (child's) nest teacher and you, if you think your child needs shorter visits. What happens at the transition morning?

Your child will need to bring a small snack with them. During these visits the children will become familiar with:

- Learning space routines, children and the teachers
- Where to store their bags, lunchbox and drink bottle
- Where to sit
- Where the toilets are
- Where to play at playtime
- Where to have a drink
- Carry out a self-portrait and name tag art activity

What is our New Entrant programme?

We work in Active Learning Spaces (ALS) and it works differently to the classrooms you will remember from your school days. Our teachers operate as a team, working collaboratively to best support your child's needs.

The Pekapeka team have a literacy and numeracy focus as well as a strong emphasis on social and emotional development which is woven intentionally across all curriculum areas.

Literacy is delivered using a Structured Literacy programme focused on letters, their sounds and how to read and write these. Reading and writing are delivered separately but following the same scope and sequence. In reading, Tamariki are supported through the different stages in small groups of 3-5 tamariki in a lesson where learning is explicitly delivered by a kaiako in ability groups. In writing, this is delivered in a whole class approach that is structured, where Tamariki are grouped according to ability.

Mathematics delivered using the Maths-No Problem programme. This programme is designed using the Maths Mastery approach to learning. It is predominantly hands on using a lot of specific equipment, math discussions and sharing their understandings through experience.

Social and emotional skills are developed intentionally through intentional provocations and experiential learning pedagogy. Skills are explicitly taught during Hauora, such as turn taking and asking how to join in a game, and reinforced during PE, Inquiry and deep dive learning opportunities.

What happens on the first day of school?

Enjoy packing their school bag with them - be sure to include lunch box, water bottle and spare underwear. It is essential you name everything, and that your child can recognise their own belongings.

You should arrive with your child before the first bell at 8.55am so there is plenty of time for them to get ready. (Teachers are in the ALS from 8:30am and recommended that you arrive as close to 8.30am as possible).

If you have not been able to attend the transition morning prior to starting, then please be at school just after 8:30 so your child can meet the teacher and be shown the morning routines and become familiar with where everything is.

Bring along all the items from the stationery list. You can name all books but do not name pencils, scissors, whiteboards, whiteboard pens, highlighters etc. as these are shared between the children.

Encourage your child to carry their school bag themselves and encourage them to do as much as they can by themselves. This helps them to develop a sense of belonging and independence.

When your child looks settled, we recommend that you say goodbye and let them know that you'll be back to get them at the end of the day – don't leave this until bell time, try to give them some time to settle without you before the bell goes. Some children become upset at the thought of their primary caregiver leaving, but quickly settle down once you've gone.

How can I help prepare my child for school?

- Read a wide range of stories to your child (repetition is important);
- Teach your child to recognise and write their name (capital for first letter, then lower case);
- Any other interest that your child shows in writing, insist on writing lower case letters;
- Count to 10 both forwards and backwards:
- Sing and say nursery rhymes together;
- Make sure they can go to the toilet by themselves or are independent in changing themselves. See here for information on toileting accidents at school;
- Teach them to get their footwear on and off by themselves and ensure that they can do this independently before starting.
- Teach them how to apply their sunscreen.
- Teach them how to say please, thank you and sorry, and share toys and other special things.
- Talk positively about going to school, making new friends and learning new things. How you communicate about school will reinforce how they are feeling about school.
- Ensure your child is getting enough sleep to support their brain to be ready to learn (research says that this is 10-12 hours each night).



What if my child is not "ready" for school?

School readiness is not about being able to read, write, know colours or counting – these skills will be taught at school so please don't worry if your child is not a master of these just yet!

Readiness is about emotional and social maturity – aspects of development that we cannot fast track. We cannot make a child who lacks the necessary maturity become mature. Developing independence, taking an interest in their learning and an understanding of certain social skills are important dispositions that we would expect on arrival.

If your child is not "ready" for school, again, don't worry! If they are unable to manage themselves then we will talk to you about this and will put in place a plan to help them be successful at school. This may include attending for shorter periods of time, rather than whole school days or you coming in and supporting your child with their learning.
